

## ROAD SAFETY A MUST



This is the sort of thing that can happen to any vehicle — yours included, in an accident. Make sure it doesn't happen to you. Take care on the roads.



ACCIDENT figures continue to cause the gravest concern at UNFICYP Headquarters. At the time of writing, total accident figures stood at 573, of which 15 were fatal and 197 had involved minor or major injuries.

Since the Force has been on the Island — a total time of 16 months, UNFICYP vehicles have, on average, been involved in more than one accident per day. In the seven months this year alone, UNFICYP vehicles have been involved in 271 accidents, — in just 210 days, although accident figures have fallen almost continually since the beginning of the year.

From a staggering total of 54 in January — the middle of the wet weather — they slid to 41 in February, rose again by two in March, dropped to 37 in April, rose again to 39 in May, and during the last two months, up till the 29th of July have dropped steadily — 30 in June and 25 in July.

Although the figures are dropping they are still cause for concern, for in October, rotation of most of the UNFICYP contingents will have been completed and figures are expected to rise sharply again as new drivers, many of whom have never driven on the left hand side of the road before, join the Force.

Breakdown on accident figures so far this year shows the British Contingent in the rather unenviable position of having a clear lead in the number of accidents their vehicles have been involved in. They total 64 — 15 ahead of the Finnish Contingent. Canadian vehicles have been involved in 47 accidents and Irish and Danish Contingent vehicles in 39 accidents each. Bringing up the rear are the Swedish Contingent whose vehicles have been involved in 30 accidents. British vehicles, of course, cover far more mileage than the others and other excuses could be found for each Contingent, but the fact remains that

"THE LAST FIVE DEATHS as the result of accidents involving UN vehicles should never have occurred. There was no reasonable excuse or explanation for any of these accidents—but five people are dead", said Lieutenant Colonel J. A. Dowsett, the UNFICYP Provost Marshal in an interview at UNFICYP Headquarters on Friday.

Speaking on the need for preventing the grim UNFICYP accident figures from rising even higher, Colonel Dowsett said, "The most important thing for United Nations' drivers coming to Cyprus is to drive defensively".

The Provost Marshal then went on to explain this phrase. "What this really means", he said, "is that when you have any doubt at all about road or traffic conditions, slow down or stop completely until you have made an assessment of the situation. If drivers would all drive with due care and attention", Colonel Dowsett continued, "fifty per cent of all accidents could be eliminated".

New U.S. Ambassador presents credentials:-

## U.S. expresses hope that UN may help SE Asia peace

THE new Permanent U.S. Representative to the United Nations, Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, presented his credentials to Secretary-General U Thant last week along with a letter from President Johnson expressing hope that the United Nations might help restore peace in South East Asia.

President Johnson said U Thant's efforts in the past to find some way to remove the Viet-Nam conflict from the battlefield to the negotiating table had been "highly valued" by the U.S. Government, and he trusted would be continued. Ambassador Goldberg, he said, had been instructed to maintain close contact with the Secretary-General on the Vietnamese situation.

The U.S. Chief Executive also reaffirmed that the United States was prepared to enter into unconditional negotiations for a peaceful settlement, and that it hoped that U.N. Members, individually and collectively, would use their influence to "bring to the negotiating table all Governments, involved, in an attempt to halt all aggression and evolve a peaceful solution".

Ambassador Goldberg told a press conference after his meeting with the Secretary-General that they had discussed, besides Viet-Nam, the financial-constitutional U.N. crisis and the Dominican Republic.

The new U.S. Representative said he considered the resolving of the U.N.'s financial and constitutional troubles the first order of business. This complex issue involves peace-keeping operations and their financing, and the controversy about the General Assembly voting rights of countries that have declined to help finance certain U.N. military operations on legal and other grounds.

Ambassador Goldberg said that the U.S. had not yet set the position it would take when the 33-nation Committee that has been handling this problem meets again next month.

A U.N. spokesman said the Secretary-General considered his exchange of views with Ambassador Goldberg "very useful", and that U Thant would give most serious consideration to President Johnson's letter.

The spokesman added that U Thant had reaffirmed his long-standing view that the Viet-Nam conflict should be settled by peaceful means, either by the revival of the 1954 Geneva Conference on Indochina or through some other agreed form of discussion.

U Thant also stressed the urgency of resolving the financial-constitutional crisis.

U Thant's reply to President Johnson was carried to Washington on Thursday by Ambassador Goldberg.

## ONCE AGAIN NO "SLOW BOAT" FOR FLYING WILLIS

The Secretary-General said that he was "heartened" by President Johnson's wish that his efforts for peace in South-East Asia be continued.

"I gladly assure you of my determination to pursue them by all the means at my disposal," U Thant wrote, "since I believe most strongly that concerted efforts should be made to put an early end to all further hostile military activities."

U Thant said he was particularly gratified that Ambassador Goldberg was to maintain close touch with him on Viet-Nam, given the "very great importance" he attached to his question.

He has had quite a U.N. ca-

reer — starting close to ten years ago when still Major H.P.T. Willis of the New Zealand Army he was assigned to the United Nations Truce Supervision Organization (UNTSO) in Jerusalem as a military observer.

He remained with UNTSO for two years, the latter as Chief Operations Officer. After his two-year tour of duty he returned to New Zealand — but in 1959 he was back in Jerusalem once again loaned by New Zealand to UNTSO. He stayed with the Truce Supervision Organization until 1962 when, as a civilian, he joined the United Nations in the Congo (ONUC) — initially as Deputy Senior Administrative Officer with ONUC in Katanga.

Peter stayed in Katanga until 1963 serving during the latter months as Special Assistant to the Chief U.N. Representative in Katanga. In September of 1963, he was assigned Provincial Observer in Kolwezi. In April of last year, while still in Kolwezi, he was given 24 hours to report to UNFICYP in Nicosia.

## UNFICYP accident figures causing "gravest concern"

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all figures are far too high.

The worst area for accidents is without doubt Nicosia Zone, which is responsible for almost 60 per cent of all accidents on the Island. In the Zone, the immediate area of Nicosia itself is the scene of most accidents but the Kyrenia district also has a high proportion.

Other bad spots on the Island are, in numerical order of accidents, the Xeros/Lefka area, Famagusta and Ktima.

Nicosia itself is the main trouble spot, with more than 50 accidents occurring either in, or in the immediate vicinity of the Walled City, including four fatalities. Other extremely bad areas are between the Myrtoon Road and the Nicosia Bypass in the area of Greek National Contingent Camp. This area, less than half a mile in length, has been the scene of 17 accidents. Around the Main Guardroom at RAF Nicosia, eleven UNFICYP vehicles have been involved in smashups within a distance of 200 yards and 13 vehicles have been involved in collisions at the junction of the Morphou road and Kyrenia Road.


## New Deputy Commander for DANCON

Geneva Disarmament talks:-

## Responsibility and restraint urged by Secretary-General

UNITED Nations Secretary-General U Thant has expressed the hope that disarmament negotiations which were resumed last week in Geneva would recapture the "spirit and momentum" that led to the partial nuclear test ban treaty and other agreements two years ago.

U Thant's views were set forth in a message to the 18-nation Disarmament Committee which met last week at United Nations European Headquarters following a recess of ten months.


The Secretary-General said the East-West detente evident in 1963 had been much eroded by political crises in many parts of the world, but he was convinced that participants in the Geneva conference would seek accommodation despite the present inauspicious circumstances.

U Thant laid special stress on the need for curbing the nuclear arms race. The U.N. Disarmament Commission comprising the whole of the United Nations membership, he noted, recently urged priority for extending the atomic test ban treaty to underground detonations and for preventing a further spread of nuclear weapons.

The nuclear powers, U Thant said, continued to perfect their arsenals, and the growing number of States that are technically able to make a bomb would be faced with "extremely grave decisions in this area". He urged "responsibility and restraint" on the part of both nuclear and non-nuclear States. Decisions relating to nuclear weapons development he declared, had a contagious effect in either curbing or broadening the nuclear arms race.



U Thant said the recent session of the Disarmament Commission had shown general agreement that partial disarmament steps offered the best chance of success, and that smaller powers could make significant contributions to the disarmament progress. He also noted the Commission's resolution welcoming the proposal from non-aligned States for a world disarmament conference, and asking the next U.N. General Assembly to consider it.

## Der neue Kommandant des österreichischen Sanitätskontingentes

Die Vormittagssonne brannte auf den Asphalt des österreichischen Feldspitals. Die drei Lagerfahnen flatterten hoch im Westwind. Zu ihren Füßen war die Mannschaft in Reih und Glied getreten, um ihren neuen Kommandanten zu begrüßen.

Der kommandierende General der UNO auf Zypern, General Thimayya, war am 15.7.1965 persönlich im Spital erschienen, um Herrn ObstltA Dr. Narodoslavsky das Kommando zu übergeben. Viele der angetretenen Offiziere und Männer kannten ihn schon aus Österreich. Andere fragten sich im Stillen, was für ein Mann ihr neuer Kommandant wohl sei.

Er wurde im Jahre 1920 in Graz geboren und ging auch dort zur Schule. Der Krieg unterbrach sein Studium, er mußte von 1939 bis 1945 in der Wehrmacht dienen. Erst nach Beendigung des Krieges konnte er seine Studien fortsetzen. Er promovierte 1951 zum Doktor der Medizin. Seit es in Österreich wieder ein Bundesheer gibt, ist ObstltA Dr. Narodoslavsky Leiter einer Heeressanitätsanstalt in seiner Heimatstadt Graz. Diese Anstalt ist ein Militärspital mit ca. 50 Betten, das alle medizinischen Fachrichtungen umfaßt. Neben seiner umfangreichen dienstlichen Tätigkeit als Leiter dieses Spitals, führt er

in Graz noch eine Privatpraxis.

Er ist seit 1952 verheiratet und ist Vater zweier Kinder, eines elfjährigen Sohnes und einer fünfjährigen Tochter.

Der UNO ist ObstltA Dr. Narodoslavsky kein Unbekannter.

Er ist 1962 dagegewesen, als Österreich ein UN-Sanitätskontingent in den Kongo entsandte. In Stanleyville hat er für die UNO gearbeitet und einige der hiesigen UNO-Beamten kennen ihn noch von dort.

Auf Zypern wird er nur drei Monate bleiben, weil er in der Heimat nicht länger entbehrt werden kann. Er selbst sagte, er will in dieser Zeit den guten medizinisch-fachlichen Ruf des österreichischen Feldspitals weiter festigen. Daraufhin hat er bereits kräftige Schritte unternommen, um die Verpflegung der Patienten dem hohen Niveau der medizinischen Behandlung anzugeleichen. Das österreichische Kontingent ist stolz darauf, einen erfahrenen und tatkräftigen Kommandanten zu haben.



## UNFICYP contributions:

## Additional sums from Malta, Sweden and Greece

MALTA, Sweden and Greece have informed the United Nations that they are making additional voluntary contributions to the financing of the cost of the United Nations operations in Cyprus.

In a letter dated 26 July, the Permanent Representative of Malta to the United Nations, Mr. Arvid Pardo, informed U.N. Secretary-General, U Thant, that his Government had decided to make an additional token contribution of £200 for this purpose.

In a letter dated 27 July, the Permanent Representative of Sweden to the United Nations, Mr. Per Olof Forshell, informed the Secretary-General that the Government of Sweden had decided to make a contribution of \$240,000 to meet the costs of UNFICYP operations for the period of 27-June—26 December 1965. The Permanent Representative of Sweden adds, in his letter, that the Government of Sweden had taken this decision "without prejudice to its stand on the principle of collective financial responsibility for United Nations operations of this nature".

The Permanent Representative of Greece to the United Nations, Mr. Alexis S. Liatis, transmitted with a letter to the Secretary-General—dated 29 July—a cheque for the amount of \$400,000 against the contributions of the Royal Greek Government to the expenses of UNFICYP for the current semester. In making this contribution, Mr. Liatis said that his Government "wishes to reaffirm their confidence in the efforts deployed by UNFICYP and the United Nations Mediator towards a peaceful solution of the Cyprus problem".

Presented as a goodwill gesture to the Cypriots with whom the Queen's Own are closely associated the programme began at 7 o'clock with the playing of "O Canada". Bugle-Major Fred Breurkens then led his 31-piece band through a series of intricate marching and counter marching displays. A feature for drums alone was followed by a slow marching display to more solemn music and then it was back to the speedy 140 paces to the minute. A number of softer selections were played at the halt and the programme ended with the lowering of the flag to the notes of "Retreat".



## Cyprus Constitution controversy:-

## TURKEY CALLS FOR EARLY MEETING OF SECURITY COUNCIL

ON Friday, Turkey called for an early meeting of the U.N. Security Council on Cyprus. In a letter to the Council President, the Ambassador for Turkey, Mr. Orhan Eralp, said the Greek members of the Cypriot Government had acted in violation of the Constitution of Cyprus in taking decisions to extend the terms of office of the President and the Greek Cypriot Members of the House for 12 months, and to change the electoral law. The decisions were taken in the absence of any Turkish Cypriot Members of the House.

The situation leading to the Turkish request for a Council meeting had earlier been reported to the Council by U.N. Secretary-General, U Thant.

The Secretary-General reported that a recent controversy between the Greek and Turkish Cypriots had increased tension in the Island. At issue, he said, was action taken by the Cypriot House of Representatives — attended only by Greek Cypriot Members since the intercommunal conflict broke out a year and a half ago — to extend the terms of office of President Makarios and of Representatives for a period not longer than 12 months, and to make changes in the electoral law in case elections became possible in the meantime.

Turkish Cypriot Members sought to take part in the House debate; but they considered conditions laid down by the Greek Cypriots unconstitutional and acted separately to extend their own terms of office and that of Turkish Cypriot Vice-President Kuchuk for a period up to 12 months.

U.N. representatives in Cyprus served as intermediaries during these exchanges.

They appealed for restraint, backed by a message from the Secretary-General on Tuesday, and U Thant said that assurances were immediately received from those concerned.

The Council was scheduled to meet on Tuesday (yesterday) to consider the question of Cyprus.

## NZ CIVPOL rotation complete

THE rotation of the New Zealand element of civilian police attached to UNFICYP took place between 30 July and 1st August.

Seventeen members who have been with UNFICYP since January this year returned to their permanent stations in New Zealand. Three members have volunteered to remain in Cyprus for an extension of their tour.

During its service in Cyprus the element has served at H.Q., United Nations Civilian Police, Nicosia and in Limassol District.

The Assistant Police Commissioner of New Zealand, Mr. G.C. Urquart, B.E.M., accompanied the incoming element and saw the Commander of UNFICYP, General K.S. Thimayya, on Saturday. He also met the commander of the Cyprus police Mr. B. Hassapis at Athalassa H.Q., and toured the district where the element has been operating.

Mr Urquart returned to New Zealand with the outgoing members of the element on 1st August.
